MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

In this our 43rd year of service in Durham Region, the agency has continued to evolve in order to meet the needs of a growing community. As the Region grows and expands, services such as ours are confronted with the challenge of attempting to keep pace in the face of dwindling resources.

Program funding unfortunately has not kept pace with the cost of doing business, and as a result a number of structural changes have had to be implemented.

We have had to reduce the staff compli-

ment in our housing, employment counselling and administration areas. While this has been accomplished mostly through attrition, remaining staff are being asked to do more with less.

We are fortunate to have the continued support of the United Way of Ajax/
Pickering / Uxbridge and United Way of Oshawa / Whitby / Clarington / Brock and Scugog. Their funding provides the ongoing stability when confronted with the resource challenges mentioned earlier

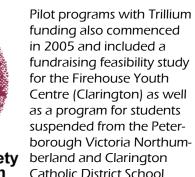

PROGRAM ACTIVITY

Last year saw a mixture of activity for JHS. Our employment services remained extremely busy, but we lost the use of our Whitby office in the start of September when a neighbouring building suffered a severe fire. If the site had remained open for the last 4 months of the year, its average visitor rate of 450 clients/month would have seen us exceed last year's activity for that program. We expect to have a new, larger location opening in Whitby in 2006.

The Ajax office has had significant growth in 2005. We made the Young Adult Anger Management program available through this site, and staff cross-trained in each other's programs to produce a team that could support each other's services. As a result, multiple programs in this office are now supporting a larger client base.

For the third year in a row, our harm reduction program (Project X-Change) has seen a tremendous increase in activity. This service plays an important role in preventing the spread of diseases such as HIV and Hepatitis through education, counseling and the safe disposal of used syringes.

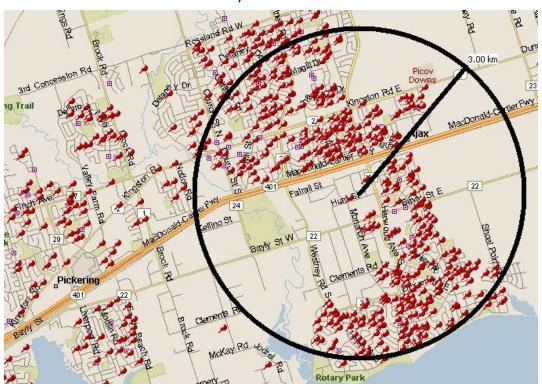

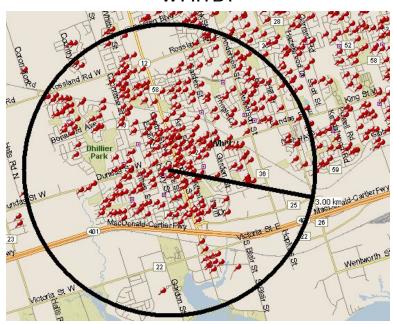
CLIENT CONCENTRATION BY GEOGRAPHY

AJAX / PICKERING

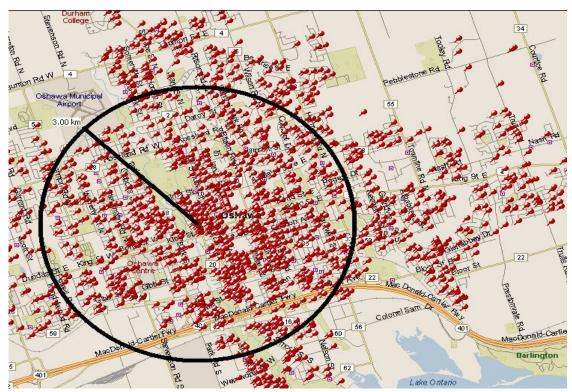


WHITBY

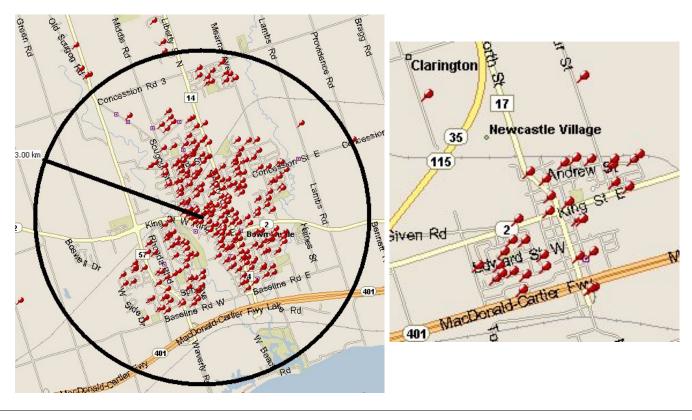

PROGRAMS 8

Active Parenting

An 8-week group program of 2 hours per session. Designed to create a line of communication with your children and enhance parenting skills. Discover how to eliminate power struggles with discipline skills that really work, such as the "method of choice." Participants also learn how to develop your children's pride and inner strength, to teach them a true sense of responsibility. This program comes in formats for parents of children age 0-4, 5-12 and teens.

Anger Management (Youth & Adult)

A 10-week group program of 2.5 hours per session. Teaches how to identify the triggers and develop coping skills to allow a person to resolve conflict in a positive way. There is separate programming for adults and youth.

Counselling Services

Individual and group counselling is provided on a confidential basis, by qualified professionals. Support is available for areas such as stress, anxiety, relationships, substance abuse, family counselling, separation, depression, court support and more.

DADS

The D.A.D.S. Program is for fathers of any age who are experiencing issues related to separation and divorce. Our weekly drop-in groups cover a variety of topics including effects of separation and divorce on children, parenting issues, conflict resolution, healthy relationships, stress management and more.

Employment Services

JHS Employment Services include Job Connect, Summer Jobs Service and four employment resource centres across Durham. Any job seeker is welcome to access our resource centres and use our Internet, fax, photocopier, resume templates, job boards and much more. For youth Job Connect and Summer Jobs Service provides one to one counsellor support. Our staff can also be called upon for presentations in schools, and to help employers with large hiring events.





SERVICES 2005

Firehouse Youth Centre

After-school and summertime drop-in center providing adult supervised recreation. Created in 1998 after the community approached JHS about offering alternative programming for youth. Each weeknight youth can enjoy basketball, pool, exercise equipment and are made an active part of special events in the community.

Housing Services

Eviction prevention, mediation and advocacy, I.D. Clinic, assistance locating housing, workshops for both tenants and landlords on the Tenant Protection Act, inmate post-release support.

Learning Alternatives

Adult literacy program for basic reading, writing, and math skills, providing 1-1 or group instruction with flexible hours. Learners work at their own pace to meet their employment, educational, or independence goals. Participants can join the program at any time during the year.

Pardons Processing

Help applying for federal pardon. JHS does not process the application, but aids the client in understanding all the steps necessary, the documentation required, how to get that documentation, and more.

Project X-Change

Harm reduction program to keep used needles off the streets and prevent the spread of blood-borne diseases. Sexual health education and resource links to vaccinations, AIDS testing and more.

Residential Program

Independent living skills education program supporting up to 14 residents. Primarily for youth age 16 to 24, this structured environment has up to 8 youth living in a house, sharing responsibilities such as chores, meal planning, cooking, and more. Each participant has an individualized action plan and counselling support.





NEW IN 2005

HORTICULTURAL TECHNICIAN PRE-APPRENTICESHIP

JHS received funding to deliver a preapprenticeship Horticultural Technician program in 2005. It was delivered in partnership with Humber College, Durham Region Local Training Board, Central Collegiate, Durham Continuing Education and Landscape Ontario and supported 22 participants in their pursuit of skills pertaining to the horticulture industry.

Participants received certification in First Aid and CPR, along with additional training in Workplace Health and Safety. Communication activities provided participants an opportunity to effectively resolve situations involving customers, co-workers, and employers. Finally, before beginning classes with Humber College, participants were provided with academic refresher courses to prepare them for the course content.

During the Level One Basic Training

delivered by Humber College, students were instructed on a wide variety of subjects including: Plant Identification, Pest Control, Turf Management, and Trade Calculations. Instructors had extensive experience in the industry and several courses provided a hands-on approach to learning everything from equipment main-

tenance to the different components of a single plant.

Students were connected with employers in the industry from across Durham Region for an eight week paid work experience. JHS assisted participants in re-creating their resume, sharpening interview skills, and researching employment opportunities. A job fair was held to personally introduce participants to employers. Eight participants developed their placement positions into long-term employment roles. Two candidates registered as apprentices.

Throughout the program participants had a chance to visit Casa Loma Gardens, Humber College Greenhouses, and other places that demonstrate the impact of horticulture.

JHS has since been funded to deliver two more pre-apprenticeship programs that will commence in early 2006.

FREE COMPUTER WORKSHOPS (CAP)

In 2001, JHS was given the opportunity to be one of a select few agencies across the Region of Durham to host computers through the Community Access Program (CAP).

CAP is part of an Industry Canada initiative to make Canadians one of the most Internet-ready communities in the world.

Many of the participants were persons over the age of 30, seeking a means to enhance their basic skills for improving

their job opportunities.

In 2005 our Oshawa site was able to provide free computer workshops for the public in topics such as:

- PowerPoint
- MS Word
- MS Excel
- Introduction to Computers
- How to use the Internet

CUSTOMER LOYALTY CERTIFICATION

This workshop trains individuals to help them be an important part of raising the level of customer service in an employer's place of business.

Customer Loyalty focuses on developing people skills to provide the ultimate service experience for your customers. The skills taught in this workshop are the fundamentals to developing and retaining customer loyalty.

Participants completing the training are able to:

- Identify why customers leave
- Identify the factors that contribute to customer loyalty
- Define "service commitments"
- Describe and identify the three "P's of

customer service

JHS has over 60 full time personnel, as well as students, and project staff, with a diverse background of education and experience. JHS serves Durham Region, and has six locations: 4 offices (located in Ajax, Whitby, Oshawa, and Clarington) and 2 residences (located in Whitby and Oshawa). Although programs differ from branch to branch across the country, reflecting different community needs, the agency as a whole adheres to the same principle. philosophy and mission.
