# Message from the President & Executive Director

There are no shortcuts in evolution, and each success can only come from a prior one. In the nearly 50 years of JHS Durham's existence, our success has been built in part upon the continued evolution of our understanding of human nature, our awareness of the needs of the community, and our cost-effective deployment of community-based solutions based on that knowledge.

Years ago, the idea of providing a service where an individual could exchange, in complete anonymity, a syringe that had been used for illicit drug use for a clean replacement was something shocking. It sounded completely counter-intuitive on face value. But our understanding and awareness evolved to recognize that we could in fact reduce risks for both the public and the addicted individual by deploying such a model.

Single fathers had no support group. Men didn't need help! They were strong, independent, and emotionally sound! Yet today, we see a steady attendance of nearly two dozen such single dads, on a weekly basis, year-round, benefiting from the auidance of a skilled facilitator, and each other.

Youth lost between the cracks of systems would go unassisted., a lost name and file number. Now we seek them out, pull them in, and get these teens on their feet through the Youth in Transition program.

Just a year ago, the problem of "Johns" and the sex trade operating in the recesses of our community was something of a white elephant in the room. How in the world could it be stopped by anything other than arrests? Partnership with DRPS, and the understanding of the root cause of both the "John" and the Sex trade worker's motives reveals that there is a means to help both parties through restorative justice.

And so the progress towards improved awareness continues, covering restorative justice models for youth and adults, court diversion, to alternatives to school suspension and more. By applying the knowledge gained from careful research, remaining closely aware of the client experience, and working with like-minded agencies, we can evolve solutions that are practical, effective, and sensible for our community.

We're proud to have been a leading voice in the development of services in Durham, and of our newest models this past year, which expand upon our efforts of harm reduction that took root over a decade ago.

# Post-Charge Adult Diversion

In March 2010, in partnership with the Durham Regional Police Service, JHS began a post-charge adult diversion option for both men and women who were charged with communication for the purposes of prostitution.

For sex workers involved in the program, it addresses a wide range of issues such as the individuals physical and emotional health, and addictions issues. In addition, areas of basic needs which includes housing, food security and income security along with individual counselling to assist with current and past issues.

Staff assist any female entering the program to establish goals and provide education to ensure that the participant has the information and resources to make healthy life choices. Diversion participants can also access the Sex Trade Education Prevention & Support (STEPS) program which aims at promoting the testing and treatment for Hepatitis C, sexually transmitted infections, and HIV/AIDS, STEPS facilitates replacing the individual's birth certificate, enhancing that person's ability to access the Ontario Health care system. In addition, the STEPS Counsellor is able to educate sex trade workers of public health clinics, provide harm reduction supplies such as condoms, and accompany a client to a doctor's appointment to reduce stigma and discrimination that someone may experience. The overarching goal is to link individuals with support and services that they may need within the community.

There are many active players in the sex trade, and one of them is the customers or more commonly known as, the "johns" who purchase sex from a sex worker. JHS adapted a John School program for Durham Region from an existing model used by Streetlight Support Services in Toronto. The School is a one-day post-charge diversion program for adult men.

The morning covers a macro level analysis and education on the larger factors that one needs to consider before purchasing sex from a sex worker. This includes a speaker from the Crown Attorney's Office discussing the legal aspects of participating in the sex trade, a Durham Police officer to discuss the community and criminal aspects, and lastly a public health nurse from the Durham Region Sexual Health Clinic to speak to the increased risk of sexually transmitted infections, Hepatitis C, HIV/AIDS that may arise from soliciting sex.

In the afternoon, the School addresses the micro level aspects of participating in the sex trade. Guest speakers include an ex-wife of a "john" discussing the familial break down, and a resident from the area in which the sex trade happens speaks to the affect it has on their community, children and families. In addition, a former sex trade worker speaks to her experiences interacting with "johns", and her story around leaving the trade. Lastly, a former john speaks to the men about his personal struggle and story around why he was involved in the trade and how to get help.

# Time Line: The Development of JHS Durham

- 1962—Oct. 23, first official meeting as "The John Howard Society of Oshawa-Whitby" takes place thanks in large part to the efforts of Keith Couse, Executive Assistant of JHS Ontario.
- 1975—After 13 years as a lay office, funding from the United Way of Oshawa enables the agency to open its first regularly staffed location 3 1/2 Simcoe Street South in downtown Oshawa. Bill Fry appointed as Executive Director.
- 1981—With the expansion of programming and client volume, the Oshawa main office moves to a larger location on Bruce Street
- 1983—First satellite office in Clarington opens. Agency name changes to "John Howard Society of Oshawa-Whitby-Newcastle"
- 1984—First satellite office opens in Ajax/Pickering. Agency name changes to "John Howard Society of Durham Region"
- 1985—Oct., Whitby Residence opens with 6 beds for young males
- 1986—May, satellite office of Clarington moves to 14 Silver St.
- 1989—Dec., fire rips through the main office on Bruce Street. Programs and services continue operation by utilizing other community spaces.
- 1992—Oshawa main office moves from Bruce St. to 492 Simcoe St. South to accommodate further growth of programming and client volume
- 1990—Oshawa Residence opens with 8 beds, 4 each for males and females
- 1997—Clarington office moves into the old fire hall at 132 Church St. ,the Firehouse Youth Centre opens, providing youth a safe after school environment
- 2001—Oct., Satellite office opened in Whitby
- 2002—May, main office moves to Richmond St. West in downtown Oshawa
- 2005—Sept., fire rips through a neighbouring building, forcing Whitby office to close temporarily.
- 2006—Spring, Whitby office relocates to 105 Consumers Drive
- 2007—Sept., fire damages a portion of the main office, forcing the Literacy
  program to run in alternate rooms for 3 months. The potential for much more
  extensive damage is averted thanks to early signs of the fire being spotted by
  two nearby police officers.
- 2009—Jul., administrative office opened in Oshawa

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





#### AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors

John Howard Society of Durham Region

We have audited the statement of financial position of John Howard Society of Durham Region as at March 31, 2010 and the related statements of changes in net assets and operations for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraphs, we conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many charitable organizations, the organization derives part of its revenue from donations and fundraising events the completeness of which is not susceptible of satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donation and fundraising revenues, excess of revenue over expense, assets and net assets.

These financial statements reflect amortization of one building at a rate equal to the annual principal reduction of the mortgage loans secured by the property. Transfers to the Replacement and Capital Reserve Fund are accounted for on the Statement of Operations, rather than as an interfund transfer in the Statement of Changes in Net Assets. These are departures from Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of revenue from donations and fundraising events, referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of John Howard Society of Durham Region as at March 31, 2010 and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles except as described in note 2(k) of the financial statements.
