As we reflect on the past year's accomplishments, we invite you to join us in our commitment to continuing our work into the future.










Program Reports: Community & Justice

- **<u>Record Suspensions</u>**: Offers confidential support to individuals to navigate their criminal record and the process of obtaining record suspensions (formerly Pardons). Subsidies are provided to those assessed as eligible.
- <u>Community Service Order</u>: Facilitates court-mandated community service with local non-profits for adult clients, aiming to reduce re-offending by increasing self-awareness. Partnered with JHS City of Kawartha Lakes & Haliburton.
- **Extrajudicial Measures:** Youth are referred from DRPS to pre-charge group and individual diversion programming to address the impacts of their behaviour/charges and learn coping strategies and community supports.
- Youth in Transition: Provides tailored support to individuals transitioning out of CAS care while they navigate independence. Referrals from Durham Children's Aid Society.
- **<u>Community Alternatives for School Suspension</u>:** In partnership with KPRDSB, provides nonacademic supports to long-term suspended and expelled students.
- **Counselling Groups:** Offers in-person and virtual classes for DADs, Anger Management, Parenting (5 to 12 Year Olds, Teens, and Co-operative parenting options). Referrals from professionals and self-referrals.
- **Direct Accountability Program:** Adult diversion provides alternatives to formal court for minor offenses, utilizing community-based sanctions for pre-charge (from Durham Regional Police) post-charge and pre-sentence (from the Crown) referrals.


Program Reports: Community & Justice

- <u>Clarington Youth Centres</u>: Offers a safe, free, supervised drop-in space for youth aged 12-18 with activities under our 5 programming pillars promoting positive youth development, connection, and engagement.
- **Harm Reduction Outreach:** Broadens the harm reduction approach by providing street outreach and public awareness as well as client assistance, referrals and practical supports.
- <u>On Point Program</u>: Employs workers with lived experience to safely recover drug paraphernalia to reduce public health risks and educate the community through safe disposal efforts while they explore their goals and increase their employability skills under the guidance of the program facilitator.
- Project X-Change: Provides access to harm reduction supplies, education, safe disposal of paraphernalia, and connects individuals to community supports. Partners with other organizations in Durham to increase access opportunities.
- **DREAMS:** Women's Drop-In Program is geared to support sex workers, trafficked individuals and street involved women by providing them with access to a safe space, food, shower, laundry facilities, brief solution focused counselling and warm transfer referrals to community partners as requested.
- <u>John School</u>: is a sex buyer accountability diversion program designed to address and bring awareness of the impact of prostitution on families and the community including the sex worker, with referrals generally coming from lawyers, crown attorneys and probation officers.

Reflections:

This past year marked the 5th anniversary of two of our youth centers, The Loft (opened September 2018) and NYC (December 2018). We are grateful to the Municipality of Clarington for their unwavering commitment to the health and well-being of our youth, fostering a strong partnership since the opening of the Firehouse Youth Centre in 1998.

Our long-running "Firehouse Fright Night," now in its 16th year, was held for the third consecutive year at Watson Farms. This event saw record-breaking participation with over 1,500 attendees and 145 volunteers. These successes were made possible by Paul Watson's exceptional generosity in donating the use of his property, and his family's enthusiastic participation in our promo trailer and event. As we move forward in 2024, the Clarington Youth Centres will continue to meet the diverse needs of our community's youth through our centers and events.




Program Reports: Employment & Training

- **Employment Services:** Provides individualized 1:1 assistance from an Employment Advisor to explore education, apprenticeship, and career options, as well as job placement and retention support.
- <u>Youth Job Connection/Youth Job Connection Summer:</u> Programming for youth that provides paid pre-employment training and full-time or part-time work experience opportunities, with ongoing support from program staff. The program wound down Dec 31st, 2023 as services for youth were integrated into our new service delivery model.
- **Learning Alternatives Program:** Works with adults 19+ with academic upgrading to support their transition to employment, education, apprenticeship, or independence through personalized learning plans and flexible scheduling tailored to their needs and goals.
- Skills Training for Employment and Post-Secondary (STEP): Supports youth aged 15-30 in navigating the job market, fostering sustainable employment or return to education through training and practical work experiences, and offering up to 7 weeks of paid skills training followed by a 12-week job placement.

Reflections:

As part of the ongoing transformation of Employment Ontario programs, in May 2023 our Employment Services contract management transitioned to a consortium comprised of The Regional Municipality of Durham as the lead agency, along with the Durham Workforce Authority and Durham College.

We are proud to be part of a service delivery network who are committed to the vision, "To foster a thriving, inclusive labour market, where job seekers are empowered to acquire new skills, secure and maintain meaningful employment; and employers can access the necessary skills and resources to create job opportunities, driving economic prosperity."



Program Reports: Housing Services

- **Housing Services:** Assists clients in securing affordable housing, preventing evictions through mediation with landlords, providing support and advocacy with the Landlord and Tenant Board, and organizing ID clinic days to obtain Canadian birth certificates.
- <u>Youth Residences:</u> Provides transitional housing for youth in 2 locations, Whitby and Oshawa (13 beds). The focus is on further developing individual supports and independent living skills, utilizing a staffing model to support the transition to successful independent living.

Reflections:

Last year, the staff at the Home Depot of North Oshawa once again, selected our Youth Residence to receive the proceeds from both the summer and winter Orange Door campaigns. From the June and December events, they raised nearly \$16,000 in donations thanks to the hard working store staff that engage with and encourage their customers to support community agencies like ours. We appreciate their continued choice to work with us, to help the youth we serve to become independent, self-reliant, and strong future leaders in our community.

In Housing, our quick service offerings, which provide essential assistance without requiring case management, play a crucial role in ensuring housing stability. By collaborating with community agencies, we bolstered our efforts to provide holistic support for our clients. Looking ahead, we aim to expand our outreach and enhance service accessibility to address the growing need for stable housing solutions in our community.




Program Reports: Administration

Reflections:

Delivering dozens of successful programs and services is possible due to our robust infrastructure of support staff, technology, dedicated personnel, and volunteers. For example, this foundation enables our team to handle over <u>66,000 phone calls annually</u>, with an average answer time of just 11 seconds and an average call duration of just under 6 minutes. This efficiency demonstrates our commitment to quickly connecting clients with the best resources to meet their needs and promptly addressing their concerns.

Our Tax Return help, through the Canada Revenue Agency for the CVITP (Community Volunteer Income Tax Program), is available for a limited time each spring and managed by a single individual. It has proven to be a crucial financial resource for low-income individuals and families. This free service ensures timely tax return submissions, enabling clients to receive the benefits and credits they deserve—amounting to over \$2.6 million this year alone.

Our success is further bolstered by the many volunteers and placement students who expand our capacity to serve. We are grateful that so many students choose to work with us, contributing to the positive and measurable impact we make on the residents of Durham.


