

# Looking back on 2024 - 2025 ...



JHS Peterborough provided training, services, and support to 1,978 clients and community members over the year.

Our *volunteers contributed over 2300 hours of their time* to support our agency and community-based programs.

We strengthened existing partnerships and cultivated new ones, including 4 new partnerships within our Community Service Order program.

Our agency, with the support of the Bingo Fundraising Team raised a total of \$18533.42 for client supports. These funds are used to directly support clients with their needs and have been integral in allowing us to provide food support, transportation, and other basic needs for clients. These funds allow us to achieve more than would be possible with constrained program budgets.

Local food insecurity has increased due to cost of living; client requests for food support have increased over 30%. We provided 770 meals, 471 gift cards, and over 390 food boxes to respond to this need.

Our agency focused on building our agency capacity through trainings for staff and volunteers, including:

- Combatting Anti-Black Racism & Centering Black Youth Wellbeing
- Harm Reduction and Overdose Response
- Pronouns & Language when Working with Transgender & Gender Non-Conforming Clients & Staff
- Motivational Interview & Stages of Change
- Community Based Mediation
- Nonviolent Communication

# Impact Report

### **Aspire Mentorship**

83 youth/young adults and 32 community mentors participated in Aspire
 34 mentorship matches were supported
 40 group events were hosted

#### **Youth Justice**

- 120 youth participated in diversion through the EJM/EJS programs
   99% successful completion rate of Diversion programming
   81 youth received restorative justice education and engaged in repairing
- 81 youth received restorative justice education and engaged in repairing harm caused in their community
  - 23 Youth Justice Committee volunteers were recruited and onboarded
    8 restorative justice conferences were held
    - 34 youth received support from Youth Court Support Worker12 platoon meetings with police partners

### **Restorative Justice & Conflict Mediation (RJCM)**

1,114 youth participated in Peer Listening Stations in schools

72 youth and 8 school staff received in-classroom Nonviolent Communication workshops

118 youth and 59 adults were trained in Peer Listening, Conflict Coaching, and/or Peer Mediation

### **Long Term Suspension & Expulsion Program (LTSEP)**

- 16 youth received support with academics, life skills, social skills, and community involvement hours
  - 125 total community involvement hours were completed
     10 youth successfully returned back to the mainstream system or graduated
    - 5 youth remain in the program receiving support

#### **Patner Assault Response (PAR)**

179 received support through PAR

142 individuals participated in domestic abuse prevention psychoeducation

192 victims and/or current partners received voluntary support services

#### **Anger Management**

39 individuals participated in anger management programming to develop healthier emotion regulation skills

27 received support in group sessions

12 received individualized support through 1:1 sessions

### **Record Suspension**

55 individuals engaged in support with their record suspension application

10 inquiries were received about this service per month on average 80% successful application rate

#### **Community Service Order (CSO)**

60 individuals were connected to community volunteerism opportunities to fulfill their mandated community work hours

### **Caring Dads**

11 parents completed child-centered parenting education

### **Transitional Housing**

12 individuals participated in the program

- 5 individuals referred by Correctional Services of Canada (CSC) stream
  - 7 individuals referred through Peterborough's By-Name List stream
    - 5 successfully transitioned into supported independent living
- 2 residents reconnected with family supports and transitioned to living with family
  - 2 transitioned out of the program received portable rent supplements to support their housing sustainability

# YOUTH & COMMUNITY

# PROGRAMS

Our Youth & Community Services office is located at 70 Hunter Street West. Our team delivers 7 programs, both on site and virtually, and also in community locations and schools.



### **Youth Diversion**

Our Extrajudicial Measure (EJM) and Extra Judicial Sanction (EJS) programs focus on providing psychoeducation and support to justice-involved youth who have been diverted from the courts. We work with youth aged 12-17 who have been charged with a criminal offence under the Youth Criminal Justice Act.

## **Youth Justice Committee**

The Youth Justice Committe offers an opportunity for youth in conflict with the law to engage in restorative justice practices. These practices include restorative circles, facilitated dialogues or other approaches guided by restorative principles. This program leverages the contributions of a team of skilled volunteers to facilitate restorative conferences.

# **Court Support**

This program supports youth aged 12-17 with navigating the youth court system. Youth may be directed to the Court Support Worker by the courts or community partners, or can access this program through self-referral.

## **RJCM**

Through the RJCM program, we provide a series of workshops and trainings in local schools, including Nonviolent Communication Workshops and Peer Listening, Conflict Coaching, and Peer Mediation trainings. RJCM builds the capacity of local school communities through skill development in conflict resolution and restorative justice.

# **Aspire**



The Aspire Program aims to support young adults, aged 16–25, in achieving their training and employment goals through mentorship. Supportive relationships are instrumental for young adults as they enter the world of training and careers. By building skills and getting involved in the community, young adults can make steps toward achieving their goals. Mentors contribute to this success by modeling employment-related skills and behaviours, sharing industry specific knowledge and information, and by becoming a consistent and caring figure in young adults' lives.

### **LTSEP**

A voluntary program for students who are expelled or suspended from school for 5+ days. LTSEP operates out of PACE, and is run in partnership with KPRDSB. The program is staffed by a KPRDSB teacher and a JHSP Youth Program Facilitator. The goal of the program is to support academic achievement while also encouraging personal growth, development of life and social skills, and community involvement.



# ADULT PROGRAMS

Our Adult Services office is located at 305 Stewart Street. Our team delivers 7 programs, both on site and virtually, and in community locations and Warkworth Institution.

# **Record Suspensions**

This program supports individuals applying for record suspensions thourgh navigating the process, completing their application, and ensuring access to the right information. Record suspensions help to reduce future barriers to opportunities such as education and employment.

# **Transitional Housing**

Edgewood Residence is a staffed tansitional residence for adult men who have been unhoused and/or involved in the justice system. Edgewood Residence is a dual population transitional housing program, and is a unique program within Canada, as both populations are served and housed under one roof.

# **Community Service Orders**

The Community Service Order program is provided in partnership with JHS Kawartha Lakes & Haliburton. Adult clients are court-ordered to complete community service hours for non-profit or charitable organizations. Staff coordinate, monitor, and support the completion of these orders.

## **Institutional Services**

Our staff assist with pre-release planning for men at Warkworth Institution by providing information on housing, employment, education, counselling and other services to meet their needs. A remote version of services has been maintained through the COVID19 pandemic.

# **Anger Management**

An 8-week training program to teach participants selfmanagement skills that allow them to develop and practice healthy responses to feelings of anger. The sessions cover understanding anger, when and why anger gets out of hand, skills to prevent it, how to deal with stressful situations, and avoid aggressive situations.

# **Partner Assault Response**

The Partner Assault Response (PAR) program is a 12-session Court initiative program to give individuals the opportunity to examine their beliefs and attitudes towards intimate partner violence, power and control, and to learn non-abusive ways of resolving conflict. While an individual is enrolled in the PAR program, the Partner Support Worker will contact the past and/or current partner of the PAR participant to offer confidential outreach and support, information, and referrals to promote victim safety.

# **Caring Dads**

Caring Dads is a 17-week intervention program for fathers (incl. biological, step, common-law) who have physically or emotionally abused, neglected, or exposed their children to domestic violence. The program combines elements of parenting and child protection practice to enhance children's safety and well-being. The goals of a Caring Dad's group are to improve fathers' relationship with their children and family, and to help them to better understand children's development and needs.
