A message from the Executive Director & President

Mohamed Sofa, President In coming together to write our annual message, we realized that this is our first report since 2020 which is not dominated by our pandemic response. While the end of the pandemic emergency may have brought some relief to our staff and service users, over this past year we were confronted with many of the consequences and longer-term effects which came to a head during the pandemic. We see health, housing, and other social systems which are long past their breaking points. Our service users are often arriving at our doors with more acute and complex needs than at any point in our history. In addition to this, the instability in the labour market has meant unprecedented challenges for our programs to attract and retain staff.

While there were many challenges in 2022/23, there was also a lot to celebrate. In December 2022, we finally made the move to our new main office and housing location on Bell Street South. By far the biggest and most ambitious capital project that the organization has undertaken in its history, the new building represents a significant stage in the agency's growth and evolution, offering purpose-built spaces that promote the wellness and belonging of both staff and clients. In addition to the spaces for service delivery, the building has also provided 40 new units of desperately needed supportive housing for community members who have been experiencing chronic homelessness.

The agency also added some other long-desired programs such as the Record Suspension, and Community Justice Coordination programs which help to address critical needs and gaps for individuals who have been in conflict with the law.

In recognition of the mounting cost-of-living pressures, and the increasing demands on our amazing staff, a key objective of this past year was to advocate for increases to our funding contracts, which could be passed on to staff as improvements to compensation. While success was not universal, many of our funders were willing to support us with small increases and we were very happy to be able to make some modest improvements to our staff compensation.

This past year was also the conclusion of our last five-year strategic plan. In 2023, we turned our attention to engaging in a fearless and honest assessment of what the organization has done well over the past five years, and areas where it can improve and develop in the years to come. This process has resulted in a clear and exciting vision for the next five years. There is no question that there will be difficult times ahead; still, there is no doubt in our minds that we have the people, the organizational culture, the clients, and the partners to work together towards enhancing the safety and well-being of our community.
